This second small challenge is to make something for your summer table!

Here are the rules: There are no rules! You can make anything! Table runner, place mats, baskets, napkins, anything you would use at a summer party!

Be CREATIVE!

Projects are due at the July meeting. All participants will be entered in a drawing for a prize!

Our July Workshop—The Dresden Plate

The Dresden Plate can be used in a variety ways. So learn to make a pointy circle, a little village, a flower, a fan block, or an easy table runner.

Please bring sewing machine and basic supplies, such as pins and scissors.

If you have a Dresden Plate ruler, please bring it. However, there will be a variety of rulers brought to class by the instructor and helpers.

Fabric- Most Dresden Plate patterns include 20 petals, so bring 20 different fabrics, or 10, or 5 depending upon the look you are wanting. You also need fabric for a circle in the middle. The amount of background fabric needed will depend upon the size of the blades. For example 5 inch blades will need about a 15 inch square background (or larger). A charm square will yield at least two plates.



Feel free to bring your own mat, rotary cutter, iron and ironing "board". An extension cord may be helpful.

Provided by instructor: Large mat, rotary cutter, some Dresden rulers, ironing board, and iron.

Workshop date is July 24. Class will start at 6:00 and end at 8:00. Please be prompt.

Spotlight Quilter of the Month

I began quilting 45 years ago. I am the oldest of eight children and began sewing at a very young age. My mother made all our clothes, coats, hats, purses, formals, etc. The only things we purchased were socks, blue jeans and underwear. I learned hand and machine sewing from my mother. We were required to take sewing and cooking in junior high school. We used treadle machines at the beginning of the semester, but ended the semester on brand new electric sewing machines. I finished all of my projects early, so my teacher taught me how to do hairpin lace as a reward. I have been a GS since I was 5, earned my sewing merit badge as an intermediate GS, and became a lifetime member.

In the late 60's, a new shop opened in our local shopping center called "Schoolhouse Quilts". When I walked into this shop, a whole new "hobby" was revealed to me. I remembered a large bag of individual yo-yo's stored in my bedroom closet growing up. I found out what could be done with those yo-yo's. I began taking classes and I still enjoy classes to this day.

In 1982 we were sent to Beaumont, Texas. As the movers were unpacking our moving vans, a nice lady came with ice and cool drinks to welcome us to the neighborhood. She invited me to come to a quilt guild meeting with her. Carol is a true "life" friend who gave me (a complete stranger) a great gift. Two years later, we returned to Akron, Ohio where my friends at church begged me to teach them how to quilt. I told them I would teach them if they would help me start a quilt guild. We met in my home for about seven months and then the only quilt guild in our area was started at our church. The guild I began turned 36 years old this past March and is still going strong!! I believe that is my FIRST legacy to leave the quilt world. Later, a good friend and I were part of the team that started the Northeastern Regional Quilt Council. Then, twenty-seven years ago, we began the Quilter's Escape in Ohio. It is a quilter's retreat held the first weekend in November at Deer Creek State Park.

My SECOND legacy is how one of my hobbies has spread through my family. I have successfully taught my first three grandchildren. They began quilting and made their first full sized quilts at the ages of 5, 3, and 3 ½. This year they turn 22, 20, and 17. Claire has taken to quilting like a duck takes to water. She has a quilt which she designed and made at the age of 14 in RaNae Merrill's book "Sideways Spiral Quilts" published in 2016. I am also teaching the three younger grandchildren who are 9, 8, and 6 this year. Claire came to my rescue when they began quilting lessons, and lately has worked with them at her home more than I have (as Grandma is 10 years older than I was when teaching the first three). My back no longer stretches over their backs to push the pedal with my right hand while helping them guide their fabric straight with my left hand.

Both of my daughters have entered the quilt world in their own way. Lisa (mother of the first three grandchildren) cuts fabric for Claire, hand binds quilts for Claire and sometimes for me and prepares

T-shirts for us when we want to do T-shirt quilts. Heather, our second daughter, made a lovely Mother's Day quilt for me by taking a quilt class in Austin. And, I cannot forget my son, Craig. He designed a Fall quilt and then made a wall hanging for an ex-girlfriend when she got married. It was beautiful. My youngest sister (18 ½ years younger) also made her first quilt with long distance verbal help from me. She just finished a T-shirt quilt for her youngest daughter Karli's graduation and it looks fantastic!

I give the majority of my quilts to family members. I am working all the way down the line with great nieces and nephews so far. I like to make all kinds of quilts – traditional, reproduction quilts, modern quilts - pieced and appliqued. I support my longarm quilter, who is so creative and gets to play with custom quilting my quilts so I can make more tops!

I have won several ribbons, but prefer to not enter quilts. I have made two quilts that have been published. My first one is called "Fuchsia Fantasy". It was designed at a retreat in Vermont led by Judy B. Dales. Her book, "Curves In Motion", was published in 1998. The second one is in a book by Barbara Brackman entitled "Women of Design: Quilts in the Newspaper 1928-1961", published in 2004. I have reproduced a quilt for Barbara Brackman and am still working on another one. The original quilts are in the Lawrence Museum.

I am thankful for an extremely patient husband and family that put up with a cranky perfectionist, for friends that enter my life and enrich my soul, and for the time to enjoy all the blessings of the Lord above.

We will continue to donate quilts to **Project Warm Embrace**, sponsored by the Kansas Division of Children and Families, in which foster children in the area receive quilts during DCF's annual Christmas distribution. They need quilts that are 45" x 60" or larger made of cotton, denim or fleece that are tied, hand or machine quilted with no embellishments (such as buttons, puff paint, etc.). Fabric bags for personal items are also appreciated. We will be making **Neonatal Isolette** Covers for the Shawnee Mission Hospital NICU. I will be the contact with Brindy Nichols, a nurse at the hospital, who has asked for our help. She will take all we can do, as she estimates they use 30 to 40 a month.

Instructions: They request that the quilts be of the general sizes of 39"x54" and 42"x60". Flannel fabric of a solid color is used for the back. There is no batting needed and the top cover can be of any type fabric. There is flannel back material available as well as flannel front material in children's patterns. The fronts can be put together in squares or strips. To put these together, we can face the right sides together, sew around the outside edges leaving an opening at one place and pulling the inside back out. Quilting only needs to be two lines across the length and two across the width, then sewing an edging around the sides to appear to be a binding.

There will be examples at the next meeting and some kits available. Because the covers are using flannel, all material should be washed before sewing to avoid shrinkage issues later.



Requirements for small quilts for charity auction


- 24” x 24”

May 8, 2018




Hand Quilters




