# Coming Up in May

## May Speaker Stephanie Brandenburg



Stephanie Brandenburg has been designing fabric for over 10 years. She launched a whole Art in Fabric movement by accident when she painted her first design, "Iris". She thought all fabric designers designed by hand. She learned quickly that was not the case. The response and love of her flowers has connected the young and old with their favorite blooms.

She is no stranger to small business and helped at her mom's store, Fern Hill Gifts and Quilts in South Amana, Iowa, for 20 years before launching Frond Design Studios in 2012. Frond is a different kind of fabric company, featuring a fine art experience and taking that to fabric. It is more than design, there is a soulful experience shared with each customer.

Frond opened a showroom in 2015 called Delve MIY. The MIY stood for Make It Yourself to show store owners how to use their product. That has become a creative hub where they develop and create through their educational program. They changed the name this year to **Frond Shop + Studio** in order to streamline the brand better.

**There is still room if you would like to take Stephanie Brandenburg's workshop** on Wednesday morning, May 15th, with Greater Kansas City and Lee Summits' Guilds. It will be held 9 am to 3 pm, at the First Lutheran Church, 4500 Stateline in Mission Hills. The theme is Fabricart. The cost is \$60, which includes a \$29 kit. Bring your sewing machine, pins, scissors, rotary cutter and mat. There will be two irons and two ironing boards there. The \$60 fee will include instruction from Stephanie and a kit of fabric. *Also bring a lunch.*

## Our Guild Members

### Our Spotlight Quilter of the Month—Jenny Boudreaux

Although I've lived in the Kansas City area for over 30 years, I am a native of Baton Rouge, Louisiana and still consider that home. One thing I love about this part of the U.S. is its strong history of quilting. When I moved here, I first worked for the Kansas City (MO) Public Library, and it was there that I learned about the Kansas City Star quilt patterns that were published for many years. I had loved seeing quilts and had sewed for basically my entire life, since my sisters and I embroidered, cross-stitched, and sewed all our clothes, among other handiwork. But I had not thought seriously about becoming a quilter until I saw those patterns in the KC Star.

I started out making pillows in the early 90s and still have a lap quilt I made by cutting the shapes with cardboard templates and my good shears - boy was I glad when rotary cutters came out! I wasn't doing a lot of quilting since I had all the fullness of life going on - family, work, church, etc. But when my father passed away in March 2000, I realized that life is short and you must find a way to pursue your passions and enjoy the time we have. So, I took some fabrics I had accumulated in the lovely 90s colors of mauve, green, and blue and made a full-sized quilt and shams - and I even quilted it on my sewing machine. I decided to never quilt a bed-sized quilt again - I am happy to support small businesses by quilting with my checkbook! I am still proud of that quilt and those shams.

I enjoy machine piecing, especially strip and chain piecing. I love those tips and tricks that people like Jenny Doan demonstrate so easily. I did recently take a class with Tula Pink on English paper piecing - she is amazing and I enjoyed learning the technique, but I doubt I'll do much of it since I don't get the satisfaction out of making quick progress like I do when machine piecing!

I love making quilts for special people, and nothing beats the look on their faces when they receive a unique gift made with love. The quilts I am most proud of (besides that first bed-sized one) are the photo quilts I made for my mother and mother-in-law. They both so appreciated those special quilts. When my mom went into a nursing home, she couldn't take her photo quilt since it was too big, so I made her a wall hanging with 3 of the best photos. I definitely recommend trying a photo quilt if you have not made one. If you don't know where to begin, ask me or others - I learned by having friends help me out!

As for advice, I would say learn what I learned when my father died: we don't get a lot of time in this life, not really, when you think of all the things we have to do and want to do. Even though it can be hard to remember, everyone's life is full - it's what you fill it with that matters. Since I became an empty nester, I joined the Olathe quilt guild to have more time being with others who love this art form. Just within the last month, I met with about 5 other ladies who all live in nearby neighborhoods to form a little quilt group of our own (and I invited them to our guild, of course). So, while I still don't have as much time as I wish to spend on quilting, I do get to learn and enjoy being with like-minded people!

Isolette Covers need to be 42" x 60".

Project Warm Embrace need to be 45" x 60" or larger.

## Kansas City Regional Quilt Festival Update

- May 30<sup>th</sup> we will receive all presold merchandise and tickets sold through May 29<sup>th</sup>. Preparation for these items will occur the week of June 3<sup>rd</sup>
- The cut-off date of merchandise sales on line is June 1. Tickets, classes etc. will continue to be sold on line and we will receive these items to prepare on Monday June 10<sup>th</sup>.
- On June 10<sup>th</sup> we will have PayPal training. Written instructions will be available.
- Pipe and Drape will not start setting up until Tuesday at 1 P.M.
- Some out of state vendors will have access to set up Tuesday June 11 from 3:30 to 7:00 pm
- We are asking all vendors to park their trailers where they are staying not at the convention center.
- The vendors will be parking under the convention center on the east side
- On Tuesday June 11 we will be taking care of the last-minute details, so we are ready for Wednesday June 12, including finishing up preparation, loading our vehicles, gathering last minute items etc.. We will have access to set up and prepare things at the convention center starting sometime in the morning of Wednesday June 12. Specific times have not been communicated to us yet.
- **We will NOT have any access to prep or set up for the festival on Monday June 10.**
- **Open classes will have tickets available during the festival, process not yet defined.**
- The Merchandise Booth will also assist in “buy it now” mini quilts that are being shown and sold to benefit charity. The quilts will be directly across from the Merchandise Booth.
- The Merchandise Booth will need to be decorated and Cindy and Janie have a plan
- The layout of the Merchandise Booth has been determined with the Raymore Quilt Guild
- Carol Russell will ensure that white glove volunteers are applied to the correct guild.
- We need more people to sign up for white glove duty – remember you could win a brand-new Pfaff sewing machine
- We have opening for a job where you will be sitting down. The shifts will be for 2 hours each. There are 8 slots open. If you are interested please email Janie Benander and Cindy Nice
- Email was forwarded to our Guild regarding turning in Challenge Quilts to Carol Russell. Date is June 2 from Noon to 4. Contact Carol Russell if you need to make other arrangements. Carol’s email address is Carol Russell [cj.russell13@gmail.com](mailto:cj.russell13@gmail.com) One of the teachers from the festival has agreed to judge and pick the Challenge Quilt winner.
- Janie contacted Sherri to send a picture of our Opportunity Quilt for our guild so Pam Coleman can do a blog in the Frontline newsletter. Get designer, who made it, the inspiration, size, how it was chosen by a guild vote for colors, who pieced and quilted it.....information is to be forwarded to Julie Griffin [julie.kiffin@gmail.com](mailto:julie.kiffin@gmail.com)
- Ricky Tims concert tickets are still available please buy them as soon as possible. We need to promote the concerts
- Over 100 judged quilts have been submitted on line and a good variety of different quilts
- As of the April meeting we have people coming to the festival from Canada and across the country. 75% of current attendees are local.
- There have been a couple of busses that cancelled, we assume due to not getting enough attendees to fill the buses

- Quilt appraisals need to be promoted. As of the April meeting only 7 people were signed up. Cost is \$60 for a written appraisal and \$30 for a verbal appraisal
- We are still trying to get Patrick Mahomes to sign the portrait mini quilt
- Demonstrations, there are 27 vendors doing large demonstrations and 8 small vendor demonstrations
- Some of the large vendors will be able to move in on Tuesday night
- Very cute hanging banners are being embroidered for each teacher that will hang in their booth for Preview Night
- Each guild will deliver their quilts on June 11. More details to follow. Quilts MUST be given to Susan Gandy and she will coordinate them being turned in.
- We are still pending what time we will have access to the convention center on Thursday.
- Bidding on the mini quilts will be done by Number Only. Each person wanting to bid will register and get a number. No names will be shown on the bid sheets. Some mini quilt starting and buy it now prices were changed. As of April, meeting 121 mini quilts had been turned in and there were more turned in at the April meeting. Mini quilt pictures are being posted on Facebook. There is also an album on the KCRQF Facebook page if you want to see them all.
- People on the class wait lists are being notified via email if additional classes are offered or someone cancels.
- Parking has changed... there will be 137 parking spots behind the McDonalds at Metcalf and College. There will be handicapped spots at this lot. The Executive team is working on additional locations for additional parking. **There will be NO parking or shuttles from Rosanna Square or Towne Center!! Expect a shuttle busses every 30 minutes or less. Each shuttle bus seat 27 people.**
- We need to encourage car pooling via our guild members
- Hotel rooms are filling up nicely
- Wi-Fi is very strong and FREE at the Overland Park Convention Center
- We do have a few vendors that we may be able to include depending on how things layout.
- Discussed the online registration of quilts and several improvements were recommended by each of the Guild Quilt Registration Coordinators
- All the thread for classes and batting is being donated by Harpers, Innova, Handiquilter Bernina and Missouri Sewing Machine
- Two more machine quilting classes have been added
- We need to continue to promote the following
  - Ricky Tims concerts
  - Ricky Tims Master classes
  - Preview Night
  - Trunk shows

When purchasing festival merchandise, please remember you're encouraged to purchase items through the guild from Janie and Cindy. By purchasing through the guild, you will not have a processing fee, and more of the sale proceeds will stay within the festival funds, making more available for distribution to the guilds.

## Olathe Quilters Guild

### General Meeting Minutes

**April 9, 2019**

President Mary Pacey called the April meeting to order at 6:34 p.m. She acknowledged our featured quilter, Carol Crane. She invited members with birthdays to receive a small gift from the Guild. Volunteers who sat with our Opportunity Quilt last week at 3 different shops were mentioned for their efforts, which brought in \$234.00. We had a representative from KCRQF, Diann White of the Raymore Guild, in attendance to display and sell tickets for the Festival Opportunity quilt. Other guests were Cynthia Glinstra and Norma Lewis (mother of member Janice Meloan.)

Pam Pearson then introduced our speakers for the evening. Gina Martin and Chrystal Manning (both local designers for Moda fabrics) gave a very enjoyable presentation on Color Theory.

After the lecture, Janie Benander spoke about the status of KCRQF. We will be handling the Will Call desk and pre-sold merchandise. Volunteer response has been excellent. White glove volunteers are also needed. Sign ups are available on the website. Our guild board voted to place an advertisement (designed by Sherri Critchfield) in the Festival Show Book. There have been 100 mini-quilts turned in for the charity night, 23 of which were donated by our guild. Additional information and updates can be found in the guild newsletter.

Teresa Jones requested volunteers to be quilt holders at the May meeting.

Mary Pacey then suspended business for two breaks. The first break was for brief meetings of all committees. Those who had not signed up for a committee were invited to join one on the spot. The second break was for purchasing tickets to the Festival, Ways & Means drawing tickets, speakers' merchandise, turn in Opportunity Quilt funds, and items for the Library Tea as well as socializing.

The guild was then called back to order to continue the business meeting. A motion was requested to approve the Secretary's March meeting minutes. The motion was made by Heather Buchwitz and seconded by Sherri Irving. The vote was taken and passed. A motion to approve the Treasurer's report was made by Teresa Jones and seconded by Kenda Camp. The vote was taken and the motion approved.

Our regular meeting place at Olathe Christian Church will not be available for the June meeting due to vacation bible school. Two options were presented. First, keep the same date (June 11) and change locations or, second, change the date to the previous week (June 4) but at the church. Heather Schaller contacted her employer, Penwell Gabel Funeral Home, and secured a meeting room at the funeral home on June 11. We voted in favor of keeping June 11 and meeting at the funeral home.

Lynda Ochs announced that she had received numerous items needed for the Library Tea and was very pleased with the response. In addition, one ticket for the tea was still available.



**Reminder:** If the Olathe School District calls off school due to the weather, we will not have our guild meeting.




