My sewing career began at home, helping my mom sew for my four sisters. She would sew all our clothes and dance recital outfits. She would cut the material and pin together and I got to sew and iron.

While I was practicing nursing, I tried out to ride the horse for the KC Chiefs. When I received the nomination, I got to design and sew my own outfit. After a few years, I opened my own business in Weston, Missouri. It was called Calico Pie. Then I started sewing for people. I also started to design baby clothes, quilts and etc.

I received an offer to work for a cardiovascular doctor and did open heart nursing. At that time, my coworkers asked me to make baby quilts. I mainly did machine quilting and hand sewing for the binding.

I guess my first love was sewing primitive quilts because of all the antiques in the town of Weston.

Then, as time went on, I gravitated to more modern quilts with lots of color. But I still like to look at and admire all the quilts at shows.

Three years ago I began to do longarm and started a business. My passion began for creating and designing. Now that I am retired, I work 4-10 hours a day and do needle work in the evenings.

On the subject of fabrics - what can I say - Its like jewelry for quilters.

I don't have the biggest stash. If gets to be too much, I donate to schools. I never realized over the years how popular quilting was. Did you know a survey discovered that individuals who are considered "dedicated quilters" spend more than \$1000 per year on quilting related items? Dedicated quilters spend a total of \$2.4 billion a year.

I have only been a member a of this guild for 7 months, but have learned so much from all the talented women.

My favorite tool in quilting is my longarm rulers. You can do so much with them.

The best advice I have on quilting is to do something different on every quilt you do. This gives you a lot of courage.



My husband is my best friend and has been my biggest source of encouragement.

Olathe Quilters Guild General Meeting Minutes August 13. 2019

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by President Teresa Jones. She welcomed everyone and introduced our spotlight quilter of the month, Carolyn Routh. She recognized guests JoEllen Randall and Tom Chaffin. She also invited members with August birthdays to receive a gift from the Guild. Teresa asked for volunteer Quilt Holders & Folders for the September meeting (need 4) and the October meeting (need 2).

Program Chair, Pam Pearson, introduced our speakers for the evening. They were Bill & Ann Say of the organization *Once We Were Refugees*. They gave a compelling and inspiring presentation on their program to teach refugees to sew through the Della Lamb Center. They stated that more volunteers were needed to help teach sewing and encouraged our members to participate.

Teresa then announced a 20 minute break before proceeding to the business meeting.

After the break, Teresa Jones requested a motion to approve the Secretary's meeting minutes. Gretchen Ryan made the motion and Shelia Pierce seconded. The motion was approved. Teresa then requested a motion to approve the Treasurer's Report. Mary Pacey asked if the fees for the Amy Bradley workshop covered the entire cost. The answer was yes and no additional Guild funds were needed. Mary Pacey then made a motion to approve the report and Janie Benander was the second. The motion was approved.

President Teresa Jones discussed the possibility of ordering more Guild T-Shirts especially in light of identifying ourselves at the KCRQF. She had worked with Olathe T-Shirt & Trophy. She discussed various styles and prices. There were enough members interested that she intended to proceed.

Pam Pearson announced the Extension Service workshops: August is *Collage Quilting* taught by herself and Arlene Banks. Arlene showed what the project would be and advised on the purchase of materials. The September workshop will be *Zippered Bag* taught by Cindy Nice who noted that it will be quilted and have pockets. There is no class in October. The November class will have 3 teachers for a Pillow Case, 10 Minute Table Runner and a Sock Gnome. There will be no workshop in December.

Pam also announced our September meeting will be Carl Hentsch, speaking on Amish Quilts. The October meeting will be Tony Jacobsen of Iowa talking about Quilts of Valor.

2021 Opportunity Quilt Chair Lisa Hirsch will continue to take fabrics for the next quilt, specifically blues, greens and purples (jewel tones) preferably with stripes or polka dots. Paper piecing will be used to make the block. Kits will be ready in October.

Karen Lacy announced that the Johnson County Fair was a success. There were 53 quilts entered in the Open Division which our Guild supervised. Twelve of our members entered quilts and several won ribbons. She thanked everyone who volunteered to help.
