COMMITTEE INFORMATION

K-STATE EXTENSION OFFICE WORKSHOPS

As of this writing our workshops for April and May at the K-State Extension office in Olathe are **cancelled**. We are working with the Extension office to explore options for virtual workshops that would be presented online. Our resourceful Mary Pacey is working on a trial run with some guild board members to test how such an event would work. We will inform everyone once we have done a trial run and have more details to share. Be sure to check your email and we will also update our guild web site and Facebook page when we have definite plans.

CHARITY SEW NEWS - WANNA MAKE SOME MASKS?

Some of you have been making masks as fast as your hands and sewing machines and sergers can fly! What started with Mary Ellen Winter asking for masks to help emergency responders and health care providers has grown tremendously - all due to some very dedicated sewers! First we were asked for 105- we gave 50! Then 10 more were requested - we gave 60! Finally we were asked for 350 - and we gave 352 - in THREE DAYS! The Emergency Management Office and other recipients are extremely grateful for our efforts. Even if you did not participate, we should all be proud that our efforts can make a real difference in multiple lives.

From Mary Ellen: "I will continue to be the point person for requests coming from the county. The guild has been wonderful in this altruistic project. Thanks to everyone for their work and generosity."

It can be confusing to know what is the right thing to do with all the conflicting information we hear, but here's **two important things to remember** if you choose to make masks:

- Use **two different fabrics** - one for the front of the mask, and a different one for the inside. This helps users know which side goes towards the face quickly and easily.
- **Fabric ties are preferred over elastic**, since they are more durable and adjustable, can tolerate sanitizing and repeated washing, and some people cannot tolerate the latex or the rubbing of the elastic. You can also cut a t-shirt or jersey or knit fabric to make the ties - just slice a 1/2" strip - no hemming or pressing needed! Elastic is still an option and masks with elastic will not be turned down.

There are lots of different patterns online, so search for "easy mask pattern" or check YouTube for videos where you can follow along . You can **contact Mary Ellen at 913-558-5710** if you don't know where to drop off any masks. Attached to the newsletter email are some good mask patterns.

Heather Schaller is our charity "fabric guardian" and has a tub outside her garage where you can pick up kits. She has bagged up bundles of 2-7yds so you can make quilts or masks, whichever you choose. If you have any donations (like elastic for mask-making), just leave that in the tub and she will use that in future kits. She is also making "S" hooks to keep the elastic from rubbing ears raw for those that have to wear them their whole shift. If you know someone having issues with elastic chafing their ears, please take some S hooks with her blessing! Her address is 617 N. Stevenson St. in Olathe. **Thank you Heather and Mary Ellen for your service to us all!**

2020 BLOCK OF THE MONTH (BOM) - APRIL

Hard to believe this BOM year is a fourth over. This month the blocks are a couple of my favorites. The first one is the Sawtooth star. I love to fancy cut a center block or if I'm making a large block to insert a smaller block in the center. Have fun!!

The 'connector' block is Flying Geese. I kind of think this is a block you either love or hate. I kind of have a love/hate relationship, I love it as a border but hate trying to keep all my points!!

I'm adding a bonus today. It's a free pattern that was posted by Primitive Gatherings. You can embroidery/ appliqué or color!! I'm finding lots of 'free' patterns these days - Bonnie Hunter has a free Mystery Quilt going as does Edyta Sitar. You can find them on their blogs. Of course the Moda Blockheads 3 is on-going. I get my patterns for it from Bear Creek Quilting web site.

Stay safe these days and enjoy your stitching. If you're making masks, take a few minutes each day to 'play' with your fabric, go outside and enjoy spring, and enjoy our many blessings.





MINUTES AND REPORTS

General Meeting Minutes

Olathe Quilters Guild

March 10, 2020

President Teresa Jones opened the February meeting at 6:25 p.m. She welcomed guests Helen Klein, and Lori Dutcher as well as new members Kathy Parker, Karen Hill, Sheri Keller and Karen Genis. Teresa recognized each member with a birthday this month.

Program Chair Mary Ellen Winter introduced the speaker, Jennifer Dick of Everyday Stitches, who gave an extensive trunk show of 9-patch block variations called "Nine Patch Revolution." She lives in Kansas City, and collaborates with Angela Walters.

Teresa Jones then announced a 20-minute break by encouraging members to shop at the Ways & Means Garage Sale as well as viewing the opportunity quilt from Twilight Stitches and merchandise offered by our speaker. Heather Buchwitz asked members to fill out the questionnaire available on the OQG Facebook page and by email, and she had paper copies. A table was set up for a block of the month progress display by Carolyn Chaffin.

The business meeting commenced after the break.

Teresa asked for approval of the February minutes as printed in the newsletter. Linda Ochs made the motion, it was seconded and approved. Janie Benander made a motion to accept the treasurer's report, which was seconded and adopted.

Jenny Boudreaux reported that the distribution problems of the newsletter have been corrected. The newsletter is also available on the website at www.olathequiltersguild.com under the newsletter tab.

Janie Bernander passed embellished samples of the Colored Pencil Quilt that will be the subject of the next class at the Johnson County Extension office, 11811 S Sunset Dr., Olathe KS 66061. The class will be March 24, 6:00 to 8:00 pm. More details can be found in the newsletter. The supplies list is available at <https://www.johnson.k-state.edu/> including textile medium and a paintbrush; a printed block will be provided.

Finances were explained by Libby Corrison, past treasurer and Mary Whitchurch, current treasurer using six Power Point slides. They emphasized that the guild has three sources of income, but expenses have exceeded the income for the past three years. The overage has been paid by banked funds. Then Lisa Hirsch, Heather Buchwitz and Janie Benander talked about the Kansas City Regional Quilt Festival plans, and the importance of choosing a committee for our guild to support.

Lisa Hirsch displayed the completed opportunity quilt. Libby will organize ticket sales and showings at other guilds this year, and Teresa Jones will take over next year.

The Library Tea is under the direction of Cheryl Wilcox and Mary Pacey will help with the table decorations. It will be Saturday March 28th at 10:00 am. This effort is part of the guild's Outreach program and proceeds support scholarships for the young library volunteers. The speaker is the

Heather Schaller of the Charity Committee invited members to a “Kittin’ Day” at her home March 19, 6:00 to 9:00 pm. Members will prepare kits for making charity quilts from the large collection of fabric that has been donated. Details are in the last newsletter.

The April program will be Kelly Ashton – “Let the Fabric Work for you,” as announced by Mary Ellen Winter.

Teresa Jones asked that members who are concerned about the spread of the Coronavirus and those not feeling well please stay home.

New member Karen Genis has volunteered to be Ways and Means Elect, along with Rhonda Weibrecht.

The Membership Committee reported 57 members present. Sharon Hall won the drawing. Carolyn Chaffin announced Carol Crane as the winner of the Block of the Month drawing. There will be a silent auction at the May meeting of the antique quilts recently donated to the guild.

Those interested in the Challenge Quilt are invited to join Cheryl Lowrance after the meeting to trade pieces of batik fabric. This will be repeated at the April meeting for those who forgot to bring their 1 ½ yards of fabric.

The Guild’s next Board meeting is Tuesday, March 17th at 6:30 at the church. All members are welcome to attend.

Pam Pearson reported that 25 people attended her informal UFO group. The next meeting will be June 3rd at the Olathe Panera. See her or the Guild Facebook page for more information. She will be giving a trunk show of her New York Beauty quilts at the next Miami County Quilt Guild meeting.

Kaw Valley Guild will have a quilt show April 4th at the Toyota dealership in Lawrence KS. A highlight will be a quilted car cover.
